In the psalm today, there is a frequent inclusion of the word 'selah', usually written in brackets. The purpose of the selah is a type of verbal punctuation; in practical terms, it was sometimes used as a musical direction (psalms were originally sung prayers) or as a means to prepare the following paragraph.

The selah, however, also holds a more spiritual invitation to engage with the psalm. It encourages a pause for reflection and contemplation. When it is used, it invites the person praying the psalm to stop, take a breath, and think about what was just said. A selah is an intentionally holy pause.

What a wonderful reminder as we continue in Lent, that despite the busyness of the world around us we can inject a selah into our day: a pause, a holy moment, to take a breath and reflect on the presence of God.

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So he told them this parable:

"There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout

that country, and he began to be in need.

So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands."

OUR HERITAGE

A short history of the Parish of St. John's, Lunenburg (Continued) The stained glass windows in the nave were given shortly after the end od World War II and were designed and built by McCauslands of Toronto. The same firm designed and built the new West Window in the tower and it was given and dedicated Easter Sunday, 1981. It is the only window in the church relating to the Sea - "I will make you fishers of men."

The manual or key board of the chimes is located near the West Window. These were given by C. Edwinn Kaulbach in 1902 and Bells were cast in Troy, New York. A Two Octave set of Handbells was dedicated in November of 1981 and these were given to St. John's by Wallace and Lottie Daniels. Thus confirming the Church's reputation as being "The Church of Bells". Also in the Balcony are two Plaques, the work of Adolphus Gates who came from Germany in 1819 and died in Lunenburg in 1873. One of the plaques bears the Ten Commandments and the other the Creed and Lord's Prayer. (To be continued)
