St. John's Heritage Foundation Update

We are very fortunate that a legacy of the November 1, 2001 fire that nearly destroyed St. John's Church was the establishment of St. John's Heritage Foundation Incorporated in 2004.

The not-for-profit corporation was incorporated as a registered charity to support the congregation of St. John's with the ongoing maintenance and preservation of its historic church properties. The initial gift was a very substantial gift directed for permanent investment, the income from which is to be used for the stated purpose of the Foundation. Subsequent gifts have been added to the Foundation assets.

The Foundation is managed by an independent Board of Directors. Three Directors are appointed by the Parish of St. John's, three are appointed by Foundation members at large and together the six Directors appoint a seventh to Chair the Board of Directors. The Rector of St. John's is an ex-officio member.

The Parish makes an annual request to the Foundation to support qualifying Parish expenses. The amount of support has varied from year to year but is generally in the range of \$34,000 to \$40,000 per year. The 2013 Parish budget included the requested contribution of \$34,000. An additional amount of \$1,400 was requested in June of this year. A property inspection of the rectory revealed necessary work that must be carried out. In response to these urgent repairs at the rectory, the Foundation will partner with the parish in an amount of up to \$12,500. This will bring the Foundation's 2013 support of Parish expenses to a total of \$47,900. That amount will exceed the Foundations projected annual income of approximately \$43,000.

Our Parish has come to rely very heavily upon the Foundation's financial support. We are very lucky to have this support available to help our Parish. We must be clear however, it is the Parish's responsibility to maintain church properties, not the responsibility of the Foundation. The Foundation is a generous financial partner, willing and able to assist with property maintenance. It should not be the Parish's expectation, nor is it the responsibility or ability of the Foundation, that the Foundation fund all of the maintenance costs of the Parish.

Christmas Legend, True Or False

If you watch the morning news you will know that one of the weathermen has a segment he calls “What I learned on the internet today”. Well here’s what I learned on the internet today. You decide if it is true or false.

The old Christmas Carol “The 12 Days of Christmas” has a fairly modern legend attached to it. Supposedly, it was written by, Roman Catholics in England, for use as a catechism song for young Catholics. From the late 16th Century until the early 19th Century Roman Catholics were not allowed to practise their faith, hence the song. What have ‘leaping lords’ and ‘French hens’ got to do with Christmas anyway?

The theory is that the song is supposed to have two levels of meaning. The hidden meaning contains an element that is a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.

- The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.
- Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments

- The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.
- Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit - Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
- The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.
- The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
- The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

Seafarers Requiem: Honouring Those Lost At Sea

The world premiere of the first Seafarer's Requiem will be performed on February 8th at the Central United Church in Lunenburg at 7pm and on February 9th in Halifax at St. Matthews Church at 2:30pm.

This piece brings together parts of the Requiem Mass as well as songs about seafarers and true stories taken from archival information on Nova Scotia's seafarers as well as those left behind. Mary Knickle has written a profoundly haunting piece calling on her ancestry and heritage to honour those lost at sea.

The Seafarers Requiem will be conducted by Wayne Rogers, accompanied by Erin Donovan and flutist is Ann Schmechel. Soloists are sopranos Paula Philips, Hannah Ernst, Alexandria Hillier and Olivia Dakin, Mezzo Nina Scott-Stoddart, Tenor John Ernst, Bass Elijah Ernst as well as a SATB choir consisting of some of South Shores best singers. Staying In Touch With St. John's

St. John's Church now has its own QR code, thanks to the efforts of Grant Dixon, who manages our parish Website.

For those of you who already use them from your smart phone just try it.

For those who have not used them what is a QR code and how does it work? QR code (abbreviated from Quick Response Code) is the trademark for a type of matrix barcode (or two-dimensional barcode) first designed for the automotive industry in Japan. We all know what a barcode is, it's that label stuck on everything (even some bananas) you buy at the supermarket.

A QR code consists of black modules (square dots) arranged in a square grid on a white background, which can be read by an imaging device (such as a camera or smart phone)



The QR Code system has become popular outside the automotive industry due to its fast readability and greater storage capacity compared to standard UPC barcodes. Applications include product tracking, item identification, time tracking, document management, general marketing, and much more.
